18TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

Dear friends, the theme uniting the readings this week is clearly that of the boundless generosity of God: God gives freely and gives in extravagant measure. This note is struck in the First Reading taken from the book of the prophet Isaiah 55:1-3. Here, the prophet holds out a vision of the messianic age to the Israelites, who have known such a miserable existence during the exile. While the corn, wine and milk that is freely offered may refer in first instance to these foods in a material sense, the invitation to 'come to the water' echoes language associated in other parts of scripture with divine Wisdom (Proverbs 3; 8; Sirach 4; John 7:37-39). This suggests that what is really on offer is a divine enhancement of life for which, in the depths of their being, most people thirst. All forms of spirituality, all techniques of prayer, seek to tap this source of life, which is the gift of God alone and which, like a perpetual spring of water, is freely given.

Jesus demonstrates this in concrete form by his feeding of the five thousand. We must underline the emotional burden the news of the death of John the Baptist his cousin gave him which made Our Lord to opt to go to a lonely place with his disciples. Not minding how upset he might be with this horrific cum traumatic news, He sets out when he saw the people, caring for them, preaching and healing those who with all kinds of diseases. Jesus demonstrates God's caring love for us by feeding the people, spiritually by his preaching and physically by the miraculous multiplication of five loaves and two fish. This miracle shows the Divinity of Jesus, the providing care of God and the compassion of Jesus for the crowd. It is a Messianic sign, presenting Jesus as the new Moses who fed the Israelites in the desert and the new Elisha who miraculously fed the starving people of Gilgal (2 Kings 42-44). The Eucharistic wordings used, and the promise made by Jesus on the following day, that he would give his body and blood as food and drink (John 6:25-70), make the miracle a prefiguring symbol of the Holy Eucharist.

So dear friends, in this whole incident, we see the care, the compassion of Jesus – the good shepherd who never abandons his flock. Jesus invites us all to unite with him in his mission- healing, feeding and teaching. We all have something to contribute and so, we can bring our little loaves to Jesus for service "Leituorgia" to humanity. The statistics from the Sunday observer in Jan 2, 1983, shows that "there are millions of people in our world today. Every three days the number of children who die of hunger and poverty equals the total of all those who died at Hiroshima (120,000), and this is a world that has the resources to end such silent holocausts". This is surely the outstanding moral issue of our time. Our problem today is not that we are unable to multiply the loaves but that we seem to be unable or unwilling to share them.

GUIDELINES FOR ST. MARY'S PARISHIONERS

As St Mary's reopens for public mass following the Scottish Government's Phase Three Guidelines, we advise all parishioners to keep to the following Instructions.

- 1. There will be a maximum of 50 persons allowed for each mass.
- 2. Social distance of 2 metres must be kept from other households.
- 3. Face masks must be worn at all times in the church.
- 4. Digital thermometer readings will be taken in the porch with hand sanitising dispensers available for all to use.
- 5. Please keep together with your household group in the porch until you are shown to your allotted pew.
- Please note that there will be no communal singing of hymns during church services as this is less safe, there may be a cantor and if so please do private virtual internal singing if you wish.
- Communion will be distributed at the end of mass. please remain seated until called by the stewards.
- 8. There is a one-way system in operation within the church and your exit will be by the door next to the sacristy.
- There will be no collections during mass. however, collection boxes will be placed in the porch and at the exit door.

- Please vacate the church after communion to allow the volunteer cleaners to prepare for the next mass.
- 13. We appreciate that this is a most difficult time for all and we would ask for your patience.
