24TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

Today's readings speak to us once more of forgiveness. We remember, last week Jesus gave us the three-step style to effect fraternal reconciliation. These three-step style of effecting corrective reconciliation: (a) going privately between you two selves, (b) taking two or three other people and finally (c) involving the believing community; were emphasized by Christ as a sine qua non in every believing community. This Sunday's gospel shows Jesus responds to Peter's question on the quantitative cum mathematical demand for forgiveness. "Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?" (Matt 18:21) Jesus' response shows that "forgiveness is the attribute of the strong" as Mahatma Gandhi said. Can anyone be able to forgive as much as demanded... seventy-seven times? Jesus' parable of the unforgiving servant, makes clearer the message. "we have been forgiven much as such must forgive others".

The first reading of today focuses on forgiveness. First, it reminds us that for our prayer to be answered, we must forgive others. Second, it presupposes that we are all sinners, in need of God's forgiveness. So, for us to be forgiven, first, we must forgive others. Therefore, Sirach urges us: "Forgive your neighbor the hurt he does to you, and when you pray, your rism will be forgiven." This is a call to liberate others, in other to liberate and heal ourselves too. St Paul in the second reading, reminds us of something very important. "The life and death of each of us has its influence on the other." Also, our ability to forgive has a great influence on the other, as well as, on ourselves. Hence, it is important to note that, forgiveness has a double effect. It is a single dose medicine that cures one or many persons at the same time. It liberates the one who is forgiven, as well as, heals the one who forgives.

So dear friends, we must learn these three facts about forgiveness. First, "forgiveness presupposes the nature of human beings to be in relationship with others". Human beings are created to live in good relationship with one another and with the whole universe. Our every attempt go against this divine plan will result in a miserable, unbearable and unproductive life. And forgiveness is indispensable part of human relationship. secondly, "forgiveness presupposes human weakness", that is, we easily get hurt and we hurt others. Sometimes we hurt others intentionally. At times, we are careless about the bitter thoughts and feelings we create in others. At other times, despite the care and precautions, our certain words, actions and responses hurt them. In the same way, we too are hurt by others. It is therefore necessary to forgive and seek forgiveness. Thirdly, "forgiveness, presupposes our sensitive nature". We are not merely people of reason, but also people of feelings and emotions. These feelings and emotions make us more attractive and at the same time vulnerable. When one of the feelings is disturbed, we are hurt. Similarly, we hurt the feelings of others. Let us examine our conscience today to see if we are holding on to any resentment real or imaginary. May we make frantic efforts to forgive others "as our heavenly father forgives us" (Matt. 6:14-15)
