25TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

Today's gospel reading brings to light a hidden truth about the kingdom of God. It shows that God offers His kingdom as a gift, "unmerited gift "which is the unique and uniform reward of those who respond to the invitation of God to work in his vineyard. Eternal life is a gift, not something anyone can earn. To teach his disciples this, Jesus tells them this parable "the parable of the workers" which violates their sense of "earning". From the standpoint of justice, we can judge that the landowner's action is unfair and so unjust, but the first reading makes it evident that "my ways are above your ways, my thoughts above your thoughts" (Isaiah 55:9). In reality, this "injustice" or "unfairness "of the owner serves to provoke in those listening to the parable a qualitative leap because here Jesus does not want to speak about the issue of work or a fair wage, but about the Kingdom of

To put things in the right perspective, we must understand that in this parable, no one is lazy, or lazing about. Rather, every one of the laborers was ready to work and they were at the places they could be seen and hired. So, they could only work if they are hired to work. So those hired early as well as the late workers should consider themselves fortunate to have found something to do for the day. In the real-life situation, we could say that they harkened to the call of Isaiah "seek the Lord while he is still to be found, call to him while he is still near" (Isaiah 55:6). But, how can we interpret this parable?

Jesus's parables as Pope Benedict XVI said are like a mirror that shows us who and how we are before God. We must try to place ourselves in them and assume the characters in them. Thus, in today's parable, the landowner is the Lord, and we are the laborers. God calls us to work in his vineyard and so we have to work. The invitation is a gift of God and He calls at his free will. We do not earn the invitation to be in the right relationship with God or to work but it is all by "Grace". Whether we are early or late birds, we all aspire to get that one great gift - eternal life. So, the message today is: "there are no unemployed people in the Kingdom of God. Everyone is called to do their part; and there will be a reward from divine justice for everyone in the end - not from human [justice], but the salvation that Jesus Christ acquired for us with his death and resurrection, a salvation which is not deserved, but donated - salvation is free". God calls everyone "and those whom he called he also justified, and those whom he justified he also glorified" (Romans 8:30). Have a wonderful Sunday!
