Dear friends, This Month of the Holy Souls is a particular time where we recall with an act of memory those who have gone before us from this life and have left their mark, directly or indirectly. It is good that we should have a season of the year for remembrance. A time when we

feel that that veil between time and eternity is thin, and we can sense that a greater and wider communion of saints to which we belong. This Sunday, we celebrate the Remembrance Sunday on which we remember all those men and women who gave their lives fighting for peace. As we lay the poppy wreath today, may we allow our memory to to help communities in need through grassroots wonder in retrospect along the memory lines bringing to our projects. They build and maintain hospitals, schools minds to full consciousness of what awaits everyone - death.

The liturgy of the word this Sunday rightly focuses on eschatology - the end things - and calls for proper preparation for when you fail to prepare you are preparing to fail". They tell us that a searching, watching, and growing heart is essential for a lively, dynamic faith in God. The first reading enjoins us to search for wisdom (wisdom 6:12-16). The wisdom meant here "is not knowledge, such as scientific or philosophical knowledge acquired by study and learning, or even the sound judgement acquired by experience and maturity. It is the reflection of God's own Wisdom, the Wisdom by which God creates the world and guides humani*ty*". This Wisdom is therefore divine, a reflection or image of God, 'the reflection of the eternal light and the image of his power'. It is a simple call to search for Christ the wisdom of God (1Cor 1:18,2:16) and the bridegroom (cf Lk 5:33-35) whose coming we await in hope. Waiting readily for the bridegroom is a divine command thus Christ's parable of the ten virgins, five wise and five foolish (Matt 25:1-13) is a clarion call to be always ready and have extra oil for our lamps. The parable teaches us that, like the five wise virgins, we should attend to duties of the present moment, preparing now, rather than waiting until it is too late.

The message this Sunday is short and simple. We need to be wise enough to remain ever ready for the coming of Christ. To do this, we must make sure we have our lamps light and at the same time have spare oil "making sure we have enough oil or spiritual fuel: oil of compassion and mercy, oil of patience, sympathy and forgiveness". May the memories we recall this Remembrance Sunday spur us forward in the search for true harmony and peace in our world. Happy Remembrance Sunday and may God grant eternal rest to these Heroes of the two wars. May their sacrifices bear the fruits of peace, harmony, justice and love in our world...Amen
