3RD SUNDAY OF EASTER YEAR B

Dear brothers and sisters, life is sometimes besieged by troubling situations or exigencies that frighten or disturb our tranquility. This may create panic and as such can traumatize us. For the disciples of Jesus, the suffering and gruesome death of Jesus was such a traumatic event that asphyxiated the joy and peace they enjoyed in their company with Jesus, whom they believed is the true messiah (Lk 24:13-35). This caused a great deal of doubt in their minds when the news of his resurrection was announced. But to cast out these uncertainties, the resurrected Christ manifests himself to them on many occasions at different places to reinvigorate their faith and quieten their minds, thus his great greetings of Shalom "peace be with you" (Lk. 24:35-36, Jn. 20:21) is his resurrection gift to them and to the world (Jn.14:27).

So, today's liturgy of the Word can be summed up with these three words: Witness, Manifestation, and **Attestation**. The first reading from the Acts of the Apostles shows the courageous speech (kerygma) of Peter (Witness) as he addresses the people about the fact of the crucifixion of Christ. This reading is the final section of Peter's speech to the people of Jerusalem after Pentecost. He lays the blame for Jesus' rejection squarely on them but shows that it was just as Scripture had foretold and then calls them to repentance, so that they can witness to Christ in order to see things from a different angle, God's and Christ's angle. One could imagine what gave Peter such stimulus. But we all know the answer - The fact that he is a witness as the resurrected Christ had appeared (Manifestation) to him and other disciples and showed them proofs that he is alive (Attestation). Evidently, today's gospel reading elucidates this. Here Luke gives his account of the post-resurrection events. The Emmaus disciples after their encounter with Christ came back to tell others their encounter with Jesus but low and behold, Christ appeared now to the whole group of disciples in their refuge, the Upper Room. The stress is on their meeting with a real person, not a disembodied ghost or phantom appearance. That is why he asked for something to eat and he ate a piece of fish.

Dear friends, the important lesson of this is that the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ brought peace to us. It means that we should not be afraid of the "Jews." The Jews here represent all those challenges that face us in life. All the obstacles on our way to holiness. all the mistakes of our past. Christ's greeting "Peace be unto you" implies that the storm is over, the trouble is over. Christ's peace surpasses all understanding and conquers every situation. So, let your hearts not be disturbed (Jn. 14:1). Peace is an internal tranquility, an inner calmness that rests on a hopeful future even amid storms. This is Christ's gift to us, so let not your heart be troubled!!
